Some services allow you to search for that special track, while others make a playlist based on your preferences. What everyone has in common, however, is that they don't cost a penny, and none of them requires you to do something more than download an application or visit a website. Just choose one from the list below, connect your earphones and let the good times flow. Pandora is an online streaming service that you can listen to via the website on your computer or via app on your mobile device. To start, sign up for a free account and use the search function to select radio stations based on artists, songs and musical genres you like. Once you choose one, the station will play similar songs to anything you have selected. You can then vote each song with a thumb up or a thumb down based on whether you like it or not. You can skip so many songs within an hour. The longer you listen, the more Pandora feels like your personal playlist. The basic service is free, but there is also a paid option that allows you to skip as many songs you like and more for those who want even more control over their music. It would be hard to find someone who didn't look for a song he liked on YouTube. Most famous artists of recent decades have videos there, and fans (not always legally) upload the song with accompanying texts. You can also find versions of songs that are more difficult to locate, including some old live appearances and TV from your favorite artists. It takes all the video content on the original YouTube site and presents it in a format where you can easily listen to specific albums or artists. You can turn off the autoplay, listen to songs on repetition, save songs in your library and more. While your music will beinterrupted if you listen on a mobile device, the YouTube Music site itself allows you to listen without interruptions. While a subscription can unlock useful features, including the ability to keep the music running even when you sail away from the mobile application on your phone, it is definitely not 128; t necessary to enjoy the range of amateur and professional musicians on YouTube Music. Spotify is similar to Pandora as it allows you to listen to your favorite music for free with the grip that you can't control which specific song is playing. Where Pandora helps you find new artists that are similar to those you already love, Spotify stands out as the shuffle function on an MP3 player. Once you sign up for a free account, you can start searching your favorite music and then create a playlist with those melodies. Spotify will then play those songs in a randomized order. While it has its limitations, you'll never be short of music, and you don't even have to sign up for an account to listen. You can choose between radio stations all over the country, whether AM or FM, and you can search in the city or genre. You can also build your own streaming stations according to your likes and dislikes. As with many of its rivals, you choose songs, genres and artists that you like to start. Slacker Radio then puts together a station with similar songs just for you.
